SCRIPTURE


John 20 : 11-18

Now Mary stood outside the tomb crying. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb and saw two angels in white, seated where Jesus' body had been, one at the head and the other at the foot.

They asked her, 'Woman, why are you crying?'

'They have taken my Lord away,' she said, 'and I don't know where they have put him.' At this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realise that it was Jesus.

He asked her, 'Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?'



Thinking he was the gardener, she said, ‘Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him.’

Jesus said to her, ‘Mary.’

She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic, ‘Rabboni!’ (which means ‘Teacher’)

Jesus said, ‘Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, ‘I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.’’

Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: ‘I have seen the Lord!’ And she told them that he had said these things to her.

Acts 1 : 3

To them, he presented himself alive after his Passion, by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking of the Kingdom of God.

MEDITATION

From Easter Day, we enter 40 days of the period known as ‘Eastertide’, which takes us up to Ascension Day. During this time, the risen Jesus appears to many people (accounts appear in all four Gospels) and they are described by St Paul (1 Cor 15 : 3-8). It is noteworthy, that in this passage, Paul omits to say that Jesus appeared to Mary Magdalene – let alone that he appeared to her first. The reason for this may be that Paul was aware that the audience to whom he was seeking to convey the evidence for Jesus’ resurrection would not have taken seriously the witness of a woman. However, it is almost certain that Paul would have known of it.

The Gospel writer, St John, writing for an equally patriarchal society, had no such qualms and it is, indeed, quite remarkable that, post resurrection, it is a woman who is the first to declare ‘I have seen the Lord’. The testimony of women wasn’t trusted in antiquity (they were not called to witness in courts of law). Jewish men, still today, recite daily a prayer that contains the words ‘Thank you for not making me a woman’! If the resurrection were not true, then Mary would not have been a good choice for the invention of a story – not only was she a woman, but she had had seven demons driven from her (Luke 8:2). The truth of the matter is that Jesus, in his infinite wisdom, chose to appear first to a woman, who had faithfully served him – notwithstanding her gender, nor her past.

This bears witness to St Paul's declaration that 'There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female for you are all one in Christ Jesus' (Gal 3:28).

Also in chapter 20 of John's Gospel, we read of the appearance of Jesus to the disciples behind locked doors (in the absence of Thomas) and then again, in the presence of (Doubting) Thomas. In Chapter 21, we hear of the breakfast on the shore of the Sea of Galilee, where Jesus asks Peter if he loves him and commissions him to 'feed my sheep'.

When Jesus first meets Mary after his resurrection, she couldn't see Jesus for her grief. That is what grief can do to people. So far as she was concerned, Jesus was dead and she had come to anoint his body for burial - such was her love for him. It was only when she heard him call her name that she realises that He is risen.


Jesus spoke her name – and by speaking released her from her grief. There are few people who will go through life without experiencing the grief of losing someone they love. And especially at these times, we need to listen for Jesus' voice calling us. Jesus deals with each person's need differently. He treats us as individuals. He calls us by name.

Looking at the four post Resurrections stories in John, we see that each person hears Jesus speaking to them personally. Mary simply needed to hear Jesus' voice say 'Mary' and her grief was healed.

The disciples behind locked doors needed to hear Jesus speak peace to them to release them from their fear.

Thomas said he needed to touch Jesus physically before he would believe, but it is when Jesus speaks to Thomas that he responds, 'my Lord and my God'.

And finally, Peter needed to hear words of forgiveness and reinstatement from Jesus to overcome his grief in denying Jesus.



Each in their own way needed to hear Jesus speaking to them.

WE REFLECT

Jesus still speaks to us today – words of encouragement, peace, comfort and healing. He speaks them to us as individuals. He speaks through people, through Creation and directly into our heart. We have to be still enough and willing enough to hear his voice. Let's now take some time to listen for the voice of our risen Lord as he calls our name.

WE PRAY

Risen Christ, you revealed yourself to Mary in the garden.

Reveal yourself to us in the silence.

You revealed yourself to Thomas when he touched the scars in your body.

Reveal yourself to us in the scars of the world.

You revealed yourself to the disciples as they walked the road to Emmaus.

Reveal yourself to us as we walk this path of strange and distressing times.

You revealed yourself to many as they met beneath the skies.

Reveal yourself to us in the wonder of your Creation.

Reveal yourself, Lord, we pray.

Lord Jesus Christ, Light of the world,
by your Cross you have overcome all darkness that oppresses:

Shine on us

that we may grow and live together in your love,
which makes us one with all humanity.
